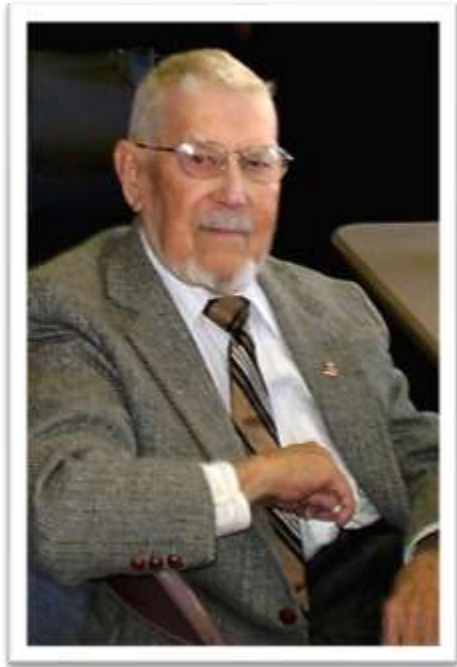

Roger **Lawrence**, #1 co-founded the American-Canadian Genealogical Society in 1973 in Manchester, New Hampshire with Mrs. Lucille **Caron Lagassé**.

As well as serving as president, vice president, and overall research advisor to our members, Roger remained involved in the day-to-day operation of the Society as it grew.

Roger's desire to learn more about the New England Captives, led him to a 30-year endeavor that culminated in the publication of this book. The publication is a small part of his great legacy to the American-Canadian Genealogical Society (ACGS).

Roger has given freely all of his material used in the production of this book. Original marriage contracts and other personal letters written by and between Roger and others with personal knowledge of some of the captives' descendants will be kept on file at the Society for future researchers to use. The publishing of this book has been given to ACGS and Roger has participated frequently in the editing processes. It is the publisher's hope that we have captured Roger's wealth of information on his subjects.

A book of this nature will continue to evolve long after its publication just by the nature of genealogical research. Letters or manuscripts could be uncovered long after publication that will enhance the use of this publication. There are a few captives that Roger found very little information for at the time of his research but he opted to include them for future generations to perhaps discover. Please be sure to read his Foreword and Introduction. They contain much insight into the material he has included.

Roger is Professor Emeritus from St. Anselm College in Manchester, NH. His field of expertise was in biology but his greater talent is in being able to help others understand the sciences. This carried through in his desire to help researchers discover their roots.
